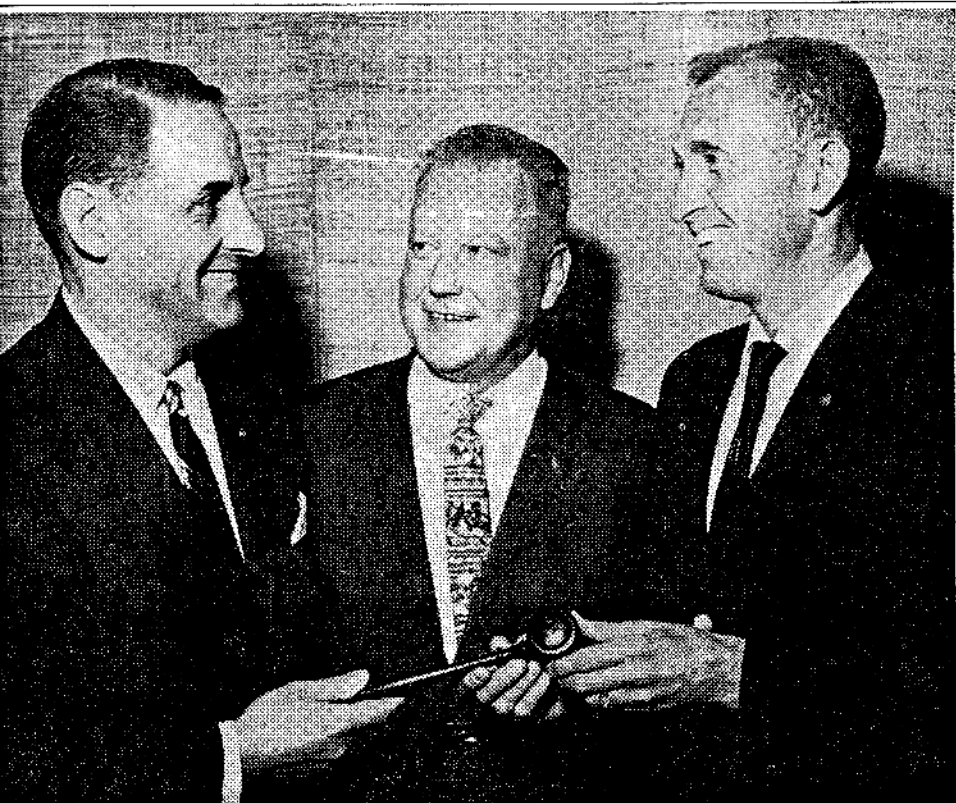

Ed Waters, general contractor and Sherman Oaks resident who has been drilling holes for planting of the shrubbery on most of the freeways, stated today that he felt this newest landscaping project will have a major role in eliminating much of the freeway noise and also in beautifying the general area.

Waters pointed out that areas along the freeway stretch between Radford and downtown Los Angeles, which have been landscaped for from three to five years, suffer very little from noise, except from large trucks.

Expressing his opinion that he felt landscaping will contribute much to noise reduction, Waters suggested that a law be enforced to compel all trucks and cars, especially those with dual exhausts, to be equipped with sound reduction mufflers.

Diesel trucks could be allowed to use cutoffs outside of residential areas, with posted signs similar to those enforcing the litter law, Waters suggested.
